I like to call baetis by the genus, because nearly half of them aren't blue winged or olive. But that's just me. There are some folks that any yellow orange mayfly is a sulphur, which is definately not accurate. A sulphur pattern will catch trout that aren't being seclusive, but on a day when trout are keyed in you better have the right local pattern to catch those picky fish.

Getting back to the question of the OP, I think you've figured it out, good job. I did see a couple of small sulphur like mayflies over the weekend that were # 16's so it may have been the fly you asked about. Then again it may not be, I never had it in my hand.
